

<p>1 Monday, 2 August 2021</p> <p>2 (10.00 am)</p> <p>3 Jury Selection</p> <p>4 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Mr Hough, just so far as jury</p> <p>5 selection is concerned, what I was proposing to do was</p> <p>6 this. I think there are about 30 jurors here. It will</p> <p>7 not be possible to get them all in here at once, but it</p> <p>8 will be possible to do them in about two lots.</p> <p>9 What I was proposing to do was have them in in that</p> <p>10 way, say the same thing to them each time, and then just</p> <p>11 explain to them that they are going to be given</p> <p>12 a questionnaire to fill in.</p> <p>13 Have they already had it?</p> <p>14 MR HOUGH: Yes, they have already seen it.</p> <p>15 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: And?</p> <p>16 MR HOUGH: Not been asked to complete it.</p> <p>17 I should also say, sir, these are jurors who have</p> <p>18 already passed a first stage in the sense that they have</p> <p>19 responded to the usual summons indicating if they have</p> <p>20 any firm objection to serving on the basis of, for</p> <p>21 example, illness or caring commitment.</p> <p>22 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Yes.</p> <p>23 MR HOUGH: Those matters have been dealt with by a proper</p> <p>24 officer of the local jurisdiction in the usual way.</p> <p>25 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Yes.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 1</p>	<p>1 someone has a medical reason, but I will say that that</p> <p>2 is what happens and that is the preference, that unless</p> <p>3 someone is speaking or has a medical reason, we hope</p> <p>4 they will wear masks. I hope that is not too</p> <p>5 inconvenient for everyone.</p> <p>6 MR HOUGH: I see others donning their masks.</p> <p>7 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: It is good for us all, I suspect.</p> <p>8 If everybody is happy -- can you do that</p> <p>9 straightaway or do you need a minute or two? All right.</p> <p>10 That is good.</p> <p>11 (First group of prospective jurors enter)</p> <p>12 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.</p> <p>13 My name is Nicholas Hilliard. I am the Coroner who is</p> <p>14 going to be conducting this process.</p> <p>15 We are going to start the process of selecting at</p> <p>16 random of names of those who are going to serve on the</p> <p>17 inquest jury. The inquest is into the death of a man</p> <p>18 called Sudesh Amman who died in Streatham on 2 February</p> <p>19 last year. He was shot by armed police officers after</p> <p>20 he had stabbed two people. I just want to say this by</p> <p>21 way of introduction.</p> <p>22 Jury service, as I am sure you appreciate, is an</p> <p>23 important public duty, but I realise that jury service</p> <p>24 of any length imposes burdens on jurors, it disrupts</p> <p>25 routine, it affects home, work and so on. But is not</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 3</p>
<p>1 MR HOUGH: The questionnaire will deal with other</p> <p>2 connections which might make them unsuitable as jurors.</p> <p>3 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: I may just run through holidays, small</p> <p>4 businesses and so on again, just because experience</p> <p>5 shows that sometimes it doesn't go in. That's what I am</p> <p>6 proposing to do now.</p> <p>7 Are we hoping they have all brought their</p> <p>8 questionnaires with them, or do we have copies for them?</p> <p>9 MR HOUGH: They were given copies today.</p> <p>10 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: All right.</p> <p>11 MR HOUGH: So unless they have dropped them --</p> <p>12 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Dropped them somewhere, yes. So that</p> <p>13 should be fine. That is what I would quite like to do.</p> <p>14 They will not be here that long, but I don't want</p> <p>15 them really to sit down while I do that. Will they be</p> <p>16 able to -- if we have two lots of 15 in, can you fit</p> <p>17 them in somewhere? Yes, all right.</p> <p>18 Then the other thing we'd just better deal with</p> <p>19 is -- I have not looked up, I have to say, what the</p> <p>20 current guidance is, but just so far as masks are</p> <p>21 concerned, and whether -- let's just see, perhaps you</p> <p>22 are going to tell me the answer. I have worked on the</p> <p>23 basis that I rather hope people are wearing them unless</p> <p>24 they are speaking. Let's just see.</p> <p>25 I think that's what we will do. Unless, obviously,</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 2</p>	<p>1 optional. It is a public duty that citizens are</p> <p>2 required to perform, and employers, for example, are</p> <p>3 obliged by law to allow their employees the time that is</p> <p>4 needed to perform what is, as I say, a very important</p> <p>5 public duty.</p> <p>6 That said, I realise that there may be particular</p> <p>7 reasons which sometimes make it quite impossible for</p> <p>8 someone to serve as a juror a particular time. Suppose,</p> <p>9 for example, you had medical treatment or an operation</p> <p>10 planned, a holiday booked, you might have caring</p> <p>11 responsibilities that couldn't be shared, or you might</p> <p>12 have a one-person business that would simply go under if</p> <p>13 you were not there. 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<p>1 the usher to complete the questionnaire. I hope you all 2 have a copy of it. One things you need to do is just to 3 write your name at the top of that, if you would. There 4 are then a number of specific questions just to check 5 whether you have any connection with the events we are 6 going to be looking at. There is also a chance at the 7 very end, if there is any particular reason why you 8 couldn't serve, and it gives examples of holidays, 9 medical appointments and so on, then you can put that in 10 there.</p> <p>11 It is not, of course, automatic. But if you do put 12 something there, I will consider it.</p> <p>13 Last thing is this. It may be very tempting to go 14 online to try to find out more about the inquest and the 15 facts behind it. Please don't do that. In fact you 16 mustn't do that. There are very strict rules now that 17 we are here about jurors only coming to their 18 conclusions in an inquest based on the material being 19 heard in the inquest. So you mustn't make any enquiries 20 or researches of your own.</p> <p>21 I think that is clear. If you would be kind enough 22 to fill the questionnaires in now and then come back to 23 me. All right? Thank you all very much.</p> <p>24 (Second group of prospective jurors enter)</p> <p>25 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 But the law says that only real hardship or a really 2 compelling reason will do. Just feeling that you would 3 rather that someone else had the inconvenience of doing 4 it will not, I am afraid, do. <p>1 My name is Nicholas Hilliard. I am the coroner who is 2 going to be conducting this inquest. We are about to 3 start the process of selecting at random the names of 4 those who will serve on the inquest jury.</p> <p>5 I think you know already, it is the inquest into the 6 death of a man called Sudesh Amman, who died in 7 Streatham on 2 February 2020. He was shot by armed 8 police officers after he had stabbed two people.</p> <p>9 Jury service is obviously an important public duty, 10 but I realise that jury service of any length imposes 11 a burden on jurors. It impacts on daily routines, work, 12 home life and so on. I do understand that. But jury 13 service is not optional. It is a public duty that 14 citizens are required to perform and employers, for 15 example, are obliged by law to allow their employees the 16 time that is needed to perform it.</p> <p>17 I do realise that there are sometimes particular 18 reasons which would make it quite impossible for someone 19 to serve on a particular jury at a particular time. For 20 example, suppose you have medical treatment or an 21 operation planned, or a holiday that was booked, or you 22 might have caring responsibilities that couldn't be 23 shared, or you might have a one-person business that 24 would simply go under if you weren't there. Those are 25 just examples.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 6</p>	<p>1 material that's been heard in the inquest, so you 2 mustn't make any enquiries or researches of your own.</p> <p>3 Just so you know -- because I will say more about it 4 later -- you may be concerned obviously about your own 5 health while you are here. I hope that what we will do 6 is that everybody will be wearing a mask unless they 7 have a medical reason or unless, obviously, they are 8 speaking at the time, which is why I am not wearing mine 9 now. But I hope that will reassure you too.</p> <p>10 All right. Thank you very much.</p> <p>11 (Pause)</p> <p>12 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: What I will probably do is just rise 13 now and wait for the questionnaires to come back. 14 Hopefully there may not be too many problems, but let's 15 just see.</p> <p>16 (10.30 am)</p> <p>17 (A short break)</p> <p>18 (11.35 am)</p> <p>19 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Mr Hough, the position is this, if 20 I can address everybody through you.</p> <p>21 We have 17 potential jurors where there is no 22 difficulty at all, so every question answered no. Then 23 of the 25, that leaves eight. If I can just run through 24 and outline the difficulties they have raised.</p> <p>25 Two of them, there is a lady, she has two children</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 8</p>

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<p>1 to look after and unfortunately the person who was going 2 to look after them has an emergency and she has found no 3 solution. I can't imagine anybody will have 4 a difficulty with standing her down. Similarly, someone 5 who has left a young child at home: "Because I don't 6 have anyone to look after him so I am worried to leave 7 him by himself". 8 If everyone's content with those two, that's 9 three -- I think we have taken those off the list, 10 haven't we, so that's numbers 3 and 22. 11 Then there are six where it could be that we could 12 make further enquiries and find out more details. What 13 I am just going to do is run through them all, because 14 if everybody, hearing about all six of them, just takes 15 the view, as I anticipate everyone may, that as we have 16 17 who have no problems at all, we are better making our 17 selection from those, then there we are. 18 Anyway, the first one is someone whose mother 19 retired in 1994 and died at about the turn of the 20 century who used to work for Metropolitan Police 21 catering. It may all sound very remote, but I am not 22 troubled at the moment to enquire whether she was 23 attached to a particular station or unit and so on. 24 Then someone whose daughter is a Metropolitan Police 25 officer. Someone who has a good friend who works for</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 9</p>	<p>1 I think have been circulated, if everybody is content 2 with those. 3 Have they not been circulated? 4 MR SUTER: Sir, they have not been circulated. I can't 5 imagine -- 6 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: No, they are very noncontroversial. 7 All right. 8 (Prospective jurors enter) 9 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Now, we have a number who have not 10 raised any difficulties on the questionnaires. Each of 11 you has been given a number. I, at random, will take 12 the first 11 that we get. I shall say a number but then 13 your name will be called. If you then, please, take the 14 next available place and then you will be asked to take 15 either an oath or an affirmation. 16 (Jurors sworn/affirmed) 17 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Good. So there we are. We have now 18 selected our jury. So far as the remaining potential 19 jurors are concerned, thank you very much indeed for 20 your willingness to serve if necessary. You can see we 21 are not going to need you, but thank you all very much 22 indeed. 23 (Non-jurors leave the court) 24 Introductory remarks by THE JUDGE 25 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Ladies and gentlemen, just some things</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 11</p>
<p>1 the Probation Service. Someone who, if their company 2 don't pay his salary, asks the question: what is going 3 to happen about that during the jury service? We could, 4 of course, find out from the company if we could get 5 through. Then someone else whose nephew is a serving 6 officer of the Metropolitan Police. Finally, someone 7 who works as a therapist and a patient is someone 8 convicted of a terrorism offence, but for reasons of 9 confidentiality she's not able to tell us who that was. 10 So there are those six. As I say, there are other 11 enquiries we could make, but if everybody is content to 12 stand those aside with the two who have the childcare 13 difficulties, that still leaves us with 17 from whom to 14 take the selection. Is everybody content if we just 15 take a broad view about those? 16 MR HOUGH: All nodding. So we can stand those six by. 17 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: So that is what we will do now. 18 Of the 17 who are all right, they have each been 19 given a number shuffled many times at random. What we 20 are proposing to do is to have the 17 in and then 21 I shall -- if I one by one do the numbers, will you say 22 the name? Is that the plan? 23 So if we could have the 17 in. After that, so 24 everybody knows, we will swear or affirm the jury. Then 25 I am proposing to deal with the opening remarks that</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 10</p>	<p>1 I am going to say to you by way of introduction before 2 we start hearing the evidence in the inquest. As you 3 know, the inquest concerns the death of Sudesh Amman. 4 He died on 2 February of last year, after having stabbed 5 two people in an apparent terrorist attack and having 6 then been confronted and shot by armed police 7 surveillance officers. 8 Where a person is killed by police officers, by law 9 there must be an inquest and it must be held with 10 a jury. The purpose of an inquest is to investigate 11 a violent or unexplained death, to explore the events in 12 a public hearing and to reach conclusions about some 13 important actual questions. Over the next two or three 14 weeks, we will hear evidence covering events leading up 15 to the day on which Mr Amman was shot, and about events 16 on that day. 17 At the end of the hearing, I will sum up that 18 evidence to you, and give you directions as to the 19 conclusions that are open to you on the evidence to 20 consider. 21 Sudesh Amman was born on 20 December 1999, so he was 22 aged 20 at the time of his death. In May 2018, he had 23 been arrested on suspicion of preparing a terrorist act, 24 and in November 2018 he pleaded guilty to 13 offences of 25 obtaining and distributing material which could be used</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 12</p>

<p>1 for terrorist purposes.</p> <p>2 He was sentenced to a term of imprisonment of</p> <p>3 40 months with a release date in late January 2020 and</p> <p>4 served his sentence at Belmarsh Prison.</p> <p>5 Reports of the prison authorities recorded that he</p> <p>6 retained extremist views throughout that time, and there</p> <p>7 were concerns about his release into the community.</p> <p>8 His automatic release date was 23 January of last</p> <p>9 year. He was placed in a National Probation Service</p> <p>10 hostel at Leigham Court Road in Streatham and he was</p> <p>11 subject to curfew hours, sleeping at the hostel from</p> <p>12 10 o'clock in the morning to 11 o'clock in the morning,</p> <p>13 4.00 to 6.00 in the afternoon, and then 9 o'clock in the</p> <p>14 evening to 6.00 in the morning overnight.</p> <p>15 He was required to wear an electronic GPS tag and he</p> <p>16 was subject to a number of other licence conditions that</p> <p>17 you will hear about.</p> <p>18 After his release on the 23rd, he was the subject of</p> <p>19 a priority investigation by the Security Service -- that</p> <p>20 is MI5 -- and the Metropolitan Police Counter Terrorism</p> <p>21 Command. From 24 to 28 January, he was under daytime</p> <p>22 surveillance by unarmed officers in plain clothes</p> <p>23 because of concerns that he might commit another</p> <p>24 offence.</p> <p>25 From 29 January, a decision was made to authorise</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 One of the surveillance officers, an officer who</p> <p>2 will be called BX87, moved close to the entrance.</p> <p>3 Meanwhile, inside the shop, Mr Amman grabbed</p> <p>4 a 20-centimetre kitchen knife from a display and ran</p> <p>5 with it from the shop. As he left, he removed the</p> <p>6 packaging quickly. He ran out of the shop at 1.57 and</p> <p>7 48 seconds.</p> <p>8 He ran north on Streatham High Road with the closest</p> <p>9 surveillance officer, BX87, running behind at a distance</p> <p>10 of 15 to 20 metres and shouting for him to stop.</p> <p>11 As he ran, and within a few seconds, Mr Amman</p> <p>12 stabbed a lady in the back outside the White Lion public</p> <p>13 house. A few seconds later, and whilst still running,</p> <p>14 he stabbed a man near a Cash Converters shop, striking</p> <p>15 him in the right side of his torso.</p> <p>16 Meanwhile, another surveillance officer, BX75, had</p> <p>17 joined the pursuit. As Mr Amman ran past a LIDL</p> <p>18 supermarket, that second surveillance officer fired</p> <p>19 a shot, which appeared to make no contact with Mr Amman</p> <p>20 but shattered the glass front of the shop.</p> <p>21 Mr Amman ran on along Streatham High Road followed</p> <p>22 by the two surveillance officers. As he reached a point</p> <p>23 outside Boots, he turned to the officers still holding</p> <p>24 the knife. One of the officers fired three shots and</p> <p>25 the other two shots. Two of the five shots struck</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 15</p>
<p>1 the surveillance officers to carry firearms. On Friday,</p> <p>2 31 January 2020, he was seen looking at knives in a shop</p> <p>3 and purchasing some domestic items that could possibly</p> <p>4 be used to make a hoax explosive belt. As a result, it</p> <p>5 was decided that he should be placed on 24-hour armed</p> <p>6 surveillance with an armed response team and</p> <p>7 counter-terrorism arrest team in backup.</p> <p>8 On Sunday, 22 February at about 1.25, lunchtime, he</p> <p>9 was seen leaving the probation hostel. He walked the</p> <p>10 short distance towards Streatham High Road observed by</p> <p>11 members of the surveillance team. By 1.50, he had</p> <p>12 reached Streatham High Road. He had not done anything</p> <p>13 of concern, but he had been walking very slowly. He had</p> <p>14 a white bag across his chest.</p> <p>15 While walking on Streatham High Road, he was under</p> <p>16 surveillance by four officers on foot. Other</p> <p>17 surveillance officers were in vehicles on surrounding</p> <p>18 roads. As I shall explain a little later, these</p> <p>19 officers have been anonymised by a court order for good</p> <p>20 reason, and they will be referred to by letters and</p> <p>21 numbers rather than using their names.</p> <p>22 At 1.57 -- so three minutes to 2.00, early</p> <p>23 afternoon -- Mr Amman entered a general shop,</p> <p>24 238 Streatham High Road called Low Price Store, which</p> <p>25 sold, amongst other things, knives.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 14</p>	<p>1 Mr Amman. He suffered wounds in the neck and abdomen.</p> <p>2 He fell to the ground at 1.58 pm and 50 seconds, so</p> <p>3 62 seconds after he had run out of the Low Price Store</p> <p>4 with the knife.</p> <p>5 The officers saw that Mr Amman was wearing what</p> <p>6 appeared to be an explosive belt. They moved away from</p> <p>7 him while they and other officers proceeded to keep the</p> <p>8 area clear. Explosive officers were called to the scene</p> <p>9 and they examined the belt and found it to be a hoax.</p> <p>10 Paramedics then assessed Mr Amman and it was formally</p> <p>11 recorded at 3.24 that life was extinct.</p> <p>12 That's a brief overview, no more than that, but just</p> <p>13 so you have some idea of what the overall picture looks</p> <p>14 like as you hear the individual witnesses give their</p> <p>15 evidence.</p> <p>16 Let me now just tell you something about some of</p> <p>17 those in court.</p> <p>18 For this inquest, I have the assistance of</p> <p>19 Mr Jonathan Hough QC, who sits at the end of the row</p> <p>20 nearest you there, and Aaron Moss, who are counsel to</p> <p>21 the inquest, and Mr Suter, Ms Taylor and Lauren Howes(?)</p> <p>22 are from the solicitors to the inquest. They have all</p> <p>23 been work on the preparations for it, and they will</p> <p>24 assist in presenting the evidence to you.</p> <p>25 Then there are what are called "interested persons".</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 16</p>

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<p>1 There are interested persons in any inquest and they are 2 people and organisations who have a right to take part, 3 including by questioning witnesses. Let me tell you who 4 the interested persons are in this inquest, and their 5 legal teams. Some members are attending remotely. 6 Mr Rajiv Menon, sitting in the front row, represents 7 the family of Sudesh Amman. Mr Neil Sheldon and 8 Mr Julian Blake represent the Metropolitan Police 9 Service. Bilal Rawat represents the Secretary of State 10 for Justice, who is responsible for prisons and the 11 Probation Service, and Ms Francesca Whitelaw and Richard 12 Boyle represent the Secretary of State for the Home 13 Department, who are responsible for the Security 14 Service. 15 In addition, the Independent Office for Police 16 Conduct is an interested person and will be represented 17 throughout the hearing. 18 Let me just say a little something about inquests. 19 An inquest is a hearing in which evidence is given so 20 that findings of fact and conclusions can be made about 21 a death. It is not a trial, and nobody is on trial. 22 An inquest doesn't decide questions of criminal 23 liability of named people, and it doesn't decide 24 questions of civil liability at all. 25 The purpose of this inquest is to establish facts</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 17</p>	<p>1 You might, for example, be asked to provide a short 2 narrative of how Mr Amman came by his death or to answer 3 factual questions. Please don't worry about any of that 4 for now. You will receive full directions after the 5 evidence has concluded about your task and how to 6 approach it. 7 You will be asked to complete or confirm a formal 8 document called a "record of inquest" and to sign that, 9 and you may be asked to complete an associated document. 10 But again, after we have heard the evidence, I will 11 explain all about those things. 12 Once I have finished these opening remarks, we will 13 begin hearing the evidence, all of which will be 14 recorded. Counsel to the inquest will take each witness 15 through their evidence. Interested persons may ask 16 questions through their lawyers. I may ask questions 17 from time to time. After that, you may ask questions to 18 clarify matters if you wish. In this case, I expect 19 that all relevant questions will be put by the lawyers, 20 but if you do have a question you would like asked, then 21 please write it down and pass it to me. 22 I have a duty, I should tell you, to exclude any 23 question that is not relevant to the purpose and scope 24 of the inquest. 25 While witnesses are giving evidence, the TV screens</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 19</p>
<p>1 about Sudesh Amman's death. 2 By law, an inquest must provide a determination 3 answering four questions about the person who died: who 4 was the person who died; when did he or she come by his 5 or her death; where did he or she die; and how did he or 6 she come by their death? 7 The last question, "how", is the most significant 8 one in this inquest, as in most inquests. In this case, 9 it means: by what means and in what circumstances did 10 Sudesh Amman come by his death? 11 As well as giving a determination on those principal 12 questions, you will be asked formally to record 13 particulars for registering his death, such as the date, 14 place of birth and occupation. You will be given 15 details of all those matters in due course. 16 Other than answering the four questions I have 17 mentioned and recording those formal particulars for 18 registration of death, you will not be asked -- and 19 indeed are not permitted -- to express an opinion on any 20 other matters. As I said, your determination may not 21 appear to determine any question of criminal liability 22 of a named person or any question of civil liability at 23 all. 24 After we have heard all the evidence, I will give 25 you directions about how you provide your determination.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 18</p>	<p>1 in court will be used to bring up photographs, plans, 2 videos and documents to which the witnesses will be 3 referred. When material is brought up on the screens by 4 the operator, it will be seen by the witness and by all 5 of you on the screens that you have in front of you. 6 It is possible that some images and other evidence 7 will be distressing, inevitably the way where a death, 8 I am afraid, is concerned. But we will make every 9 effort to limit such evidence and to give warnings when 10 it does need. 11 Some evidence will probably be read to you without 12 the witness having to come to court. If that happens, 13 it will likely be because nobody has required the 14 witness's evidence; their evidence is not in dispute. 15 Before the first witness gives evidence, each of you 16 will be provided with a jury bundle containing some key 17 plans and some photographs which will be explained to 18 you during the evidence. It may be that we will give 19 you more documents to help as we go along. 20 At the end of all the evidence, which as I say 21 I expect will be in a little over two weeks' time, 22 I will sum the case up to you, I will give you written 23 directions on the law, indicating the conclusions you 24 should consider, any questions you should answer, and 25 what factual findings are required to support the</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 20</p>

<p>1 conclusions. I shall also summarise the evidence which 2 has been presented to you, providing you with some of 3 the key parts.</p> <p>4 If you want to make any notes of your own during the 5 evidence, I am not sure if they are there now but they 6 may be, but notebooks are available for that purpose if 7 you want to make notes, but you don't have to. At the 8 end of my summing up, I will invite you to retire and 9 consider your findings and conclusions. Please don't go 4 looking for coverage whilst the inquest is going on. If 5 you should come across anything, please stop reading or 6 looking or listening. The reason for that is simply 7 this: reasons of space mean that no media report covers 8 the whole of the proceedings, so a selection is made. 9 You, on the other hand, hear all the evidence just as it 10 is given and you have undertaken to make your decisions 11 on that and to come to your conclusions on all of the 12 evidence and not on the basis of the selection that 13 somebody else makes or a summary that somebody else 14 prepares in a media report.</p> <p>15 I mention this, what I am coming to next, when you 16 first came into court. <p>1 When you get home tonight, for example, if there is 2 anyone there and if they know that you are doing jury 3 service, well, they may ask you what the case is all 4 about. It is a very obvious question for anyone to ask. 5 But if you do start to talk about the case, they may 6 very soon give you their opinion about it, when of 7 course they won't have seen any of the witnesses or 8 heard any of the evidence, and that would be quite 9 wrong. It is your conclusions that are required at the 10 end of the inquest, not anyone else's.</p> <p>11 If you are going to discuss the case amongst 12 yourselves -- so amongst the twelve of you -- please 13 don't do that unless you are all together in your jury 14 room. Everyone in court, and the public, 2 are entitled to know all the evidence on which you have 3 made your decisions and come to your conclusions. If 4 you were to introduce into the jury room the products of 5 your own researches, such as the results of internet 6 searches, no one would know you had done that, they 7 wouldn't have been seen and tested in open court for 8 everyone to see and hear.</p> <p>9 Of course, we all know that internet search tools 10 like Google can be very useful, but we also know that 11 there is a awful lot of misleading and inaccurate 12 information out there, so it is very important for the 13 integrity and the fairness of the inquest proceedings 14 that you should not make your own investigations. Of 15 course you can still use the internet for your own 16 private affairs, but you must not use it to investigate 17 the facts of this case in any way.</p> <p>18 So the rules, I hope, are very simple: don't 19 communicate with anyone about the inquest outside your 20 own number unless you are all together in one of the 21 jury rooms, and don't make any researches or enquiries 22 of your own.</p> <p>23 They are very straightforward, but breaking them is 24 a very serious matter, which can amount to a contempt of 25 court or even the criminal offence of juror misconduct,</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 24</p>

<p>1 Q. Did he take his GCSEs at the end of the school year in 2 summer 2016? 3 A. He did, yes, that's correct. 4 Q. Where did he move on from there? 5 A. In 2016 -- September 2016 -- he moved to Barnet 6 Southgate College. 7 Q. Did he remain there for very long? 8 A. He was excluded in 2017 due to fighting in the school. 9 Q. Did he have further contact with the police later in 10 2017 in the summer? 11 A. He did, yes. In May and June he was convicted of 12 possession of cannabis and threatening a person with 13 a weapon in a public place. 14 Q. That's taken us to 2017. I am now going to ask you 15 about events from the middle of 2018, which became more 16 serious. I am looking at pages 5 and 6 of your report. 17 A. Yes. 18 Q. In May 2018, what happened regarding Sudesh Amman? 19 A. He was arrested on suspicion of engaging in and 20 preparing for acts of terrorism, which is under 21 section 5 of the Terrorism Act. 22 Q. Did this result from a Metropolitan Police investigation 23 called Operation Deepish? 24 A. It did, yes. 25 Q. What were the basic facts underlying his arrest and</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 34</p>	<p>1 with collecting material useful for terrorism and 2 disseminating terrorist publications. 3 Q. Did those charges lead to a conviction? 4 A. Yes. He was convicted in December 2018. He received 5 three years and four months on conviction, having 6 pleaded guilty. 7 Q. So he was sentenced to a term of three years and four 8 months, or 40 months; what time did he actually spend in 9 prison? 10 A. Well, he was actually released in January 20th, so from 11 May 2018 to January 20th, he was in prison. That is on 12 remand and in sentence, so after conviction. 13 Q. From that time, when he was released on 23 January, was</p> <p>5 he subject to a number of stringent licence conditions</p> <p>6 which regulated every aspect of his life?</p> <p>7 A. Yes, he was. If we look at the top half of this page, can we see, 19 first of all, the suspension in September 2015 for being 20 under the influence of illegal substances while at 21 school? 22 A. Yes, that's right. 23 Q. And, page 3, please, a further suspension in January 24 2016 for being in possession of tobacco and smoking at 25 school?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 117</p>	<p>1 Q. So some very serious offences were considered -- 2 A. Yes. 3 Q. -- charging, but in the event no action was taken? 4 A. That's correct. 5 Q. 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<p>1 the house. He appears to be a disturbed and confused 2 child and puts himself in trouble by getting into 3 troublesome association. He appears to be very stubborn 4 aggressive and challenging to engage. He can be very 5 rude and aggressive with professionals. He has been 6 vocal with social worker; however may not give right 7 account of details of the events or his 8 beliefs/thoughts." 9 Was that part of the assessment of the social 10 workers at that time? 11 A. Yes, it was. 12 Q. Page 11, please, under "[Educational] & behavioural 13 development" towards the top. 14 Can we see that the social worker noted that while 15 Sudesh had a sweet side to his personality, he had an 16 unstable and volatile behaviour which could put him into 17 conflict with the law? 18 A. Yes, that's right. 19 Q. Further down the page, "Family & social relationships". 20 Can we see that the social worker noted that 21 Sudesh Amman spoke affectionately about his mother, 22 understood her overburdened role but expected her to do 23 everything for him? 24 A. Yes. 25 Q. And described himself as not having many friends?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 125</p>	<p>1 A. Yes, that's right. 2 Q. Take that off screen now, and looking at your 3 paragraph 1.26, was there a home visit by the youth 4 offending team in May 2017 which involved any 5 significant observations? 6 A. Yes. That's right. That happened on 30 May. 7 Q. What happened on that occasion? 8 A. Sudesh became verbally aggressive and said professionals 9 were calling him a terrorist based on some things said 10 to him by his mother after a previous Child in Need 11 meeting. 12 Q. Did he make any comments about the country, the UK? 13 A. He did. He said, "Great Britain isn't so great". 14 Q. Shortly after that, so in early June 2017, was he 15 referred to the Government's "Prevent" programme, which 16 is designed to move people away from extremism? 17 A. Yes, he was, on 8 June. 18 Q. What was the result of that referral? 19 A. It was determined that the information did not meet the 20 threshold for Prevent case management or Channel, 21 following a multi-agency discussion. 22 Q. Was he subject to a mental health service assessment 23 later in June 7 February? 24 A. Yes, he was. 25 Q. And we have on screen INQ001332, at page 18. <p>1 A. Yes, that's right. 2 Q. Page 15, please, middle of the page. The "Analysis and 3 professional judgment". We see that the social worker 4 summarised that Sudesh Amman's mother was struggling to 5 manage the behaviour of her children, and the social 6 worker expressed concern about the influence the elder 7 brothers might be having on the younger brothers? 8 A. Yes, that's right. 9 Q. Including Sudesh's volatility and anger issues? 10 A. Yes. 11 Q. Then page 16, please, the middle of the page under 12 "Views of child(ren) on the assessment", we see this: 13 "Sudesh doesn't take responsibility for the 14 incidences so far and is of the view that external 15 factors and people have put him in trouble in the past. 16 He thinks the involvement of professionals in his life 17 is being forceful and he is unsure about his engagement 18 in the future. He also has fear of police labelling him 19 as a terrorist in future and putting charges on him." 20 A. Yes, that's right. 21 Q. And expresses a desire to go out of the country? 22 A. Yes. 23 Q. In summary, did the social worker make a recommendation 24 for Sudesh Amman to receive intervention from the youth 25 offending team?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 126</p>	<p>1 rotate that and focus in on the section headed "Mental 2 health needs" towards the bottom of the page. 3 Are we looking here at a section of the local 4 authority social work notes which identifies the result 5 of this assessment in June 2017? 6 A. Yes. 7 Q. Do we see from this reference to "anger outbursts and 8 behavioural problems" with no prior history of contact 9 with mental health services? 10 A. Yes. 11 Q. Did the worker also note a particular disturbing or 12 traumatic experience in Sri Lanka during a family 13 holiday around year 10, so around the age of 15? 14 A. Yes, they did. They mentioned that Sudesh had seen the 15 decapitation of human bodies. 16 Q. Page 25, the box under "Safety and Wellbeing", can we</p> <p>25 see that the assessor identifies a significant risk of</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 130</p>	<p>1 Q. What was he studying there?</p> <p>2 A. Medical science at level 3.</p> <p>3 Q. Did he have some work placements while he was there?</p> <p>4 A. Yes, with pharmacies in the Wembley and Harrow area.</p> <p>5 Q. Did he take part in some voluntary work while he was</p> <p>6 there?</p> <p>7 A. He did, with a youth centre scheme and London Parade,</p> <p>8 after the conditions supervised by the youth offending</p> <p>9 team.</p> <p>10 Q. Those were not really voluntary; they were required by</p> <p>11 his youth offending team, were they?</p> <p>12 A. Yes.</p> <p>13 Q. Do we see that Sudesh referred to anger at the treatment</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 132</p>

1 of Muslims in other parts of the world? That's about
 2 four lines in the second paragraph:
 3 "He told me that he gets angry about how Muslims and
 4 other people are treated throughout the world."
 5 **A. Yes, that's right.**
 6 Q. Page 34, please, and the conclusion of the assessment,
 7 under "Outcome", can we see that the case worker
 8 concluded on this occasion that Sudesh Amman had engaged
 9 very well with his assessment?
 10 **A. Yes, that's right.**
 11 Q. Page 39, please, a concluding session on 23 February
 12 2018. If we focus in on the highlighted section, we see
 13 that when asked about the views of different extremist
 14 groups:
 15 "He said he disagreed with the ideological courses
 16 of far-right and Shia groups, but could understand why
 17 some people might fight on behalf of Sunni groups ..."
 18 As they were suffering most in certain parts of the
 19 world?
 20 **A. Yes, that's right.**
 21 MR HOUGH: Sir, would that be a convenient time to break
 22 off?
 23 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Yes, certainly.
 24 So we will break off now, members of the jury,
 25 please, until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Thank you.
