

<p>1 Friday 20 August 2021 2 Jury Deliberation (continued) 3 (9.30 am) 4 (The hearing was delayed) 5 (9.45 am) 6 (The court assembled in the absence of the jury) 7 (In the presence of the jury) 8 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. 9 So I shall just remind the jury bailiffs that they're 10 still bound by their oath or affirmations and then ask 11 you please to retire and resume your deliberations. 12 (The jury retired again to consider their conclusions at 13 9.49 am) 14 (In the absence of the jury - extracted) 15 (9.55 am) 16 (The court retired) 17 (11.30 am) 18 (In the absence of the jury - extracted) 19 (11.35 am) 20 (In the presence of the jury) 21 VERDICT 22 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: There we are. 23 Ladies and gentlemen, thank you very much, I have 24 the questionnaire. Which is your foreman or forewoman? 25 There. So what I'm going to do is I'm just going to go</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 1</p>	<p>1 And what I will do is read out the statement, but 2 then indicate the amendments that you wish made to it, 3 all right? 4 So it reads as follows: 5 "On 2 February 2020 Sudesh Amman was on Streatham 6 High Road in south London. He had been automatically 7 released from detention on 23 January 2020, after 8 serving half of a custodial sentence for terrorism 9 offences. By 2 February 2020 he was under round the 10 clock surveillance by armed police officers. Shortly 11 before 2 pm he entered a shop and took a large kitchen 12 knife without paying. He ran from the shop while 13 removing the packaging and arming himself with the 14 knife. In the following seconds he attacked two 15 pedestrians, both of whom suffered stab injuries, one 16 very serious injuries. He was pursued by two armed 17 police officers in plain clothes." 18 Then you've inserted there: 19 "A shot was fired by one of the police officers but 20 missed Sudesh Amman." 21 It goes on: 22 "After about 100 metres he stopped and moved towards 23 the officers with the knife raised." 24 It reads, at the moment: 25 "In response, the officers fired a total of five</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 3</p>
<p>1 through the completed questionnaire with you and just 2 ask you to confirm that what I am saying is the 3 position. It will be the position because you've 4 written it down but just so that everybody publicly 5 knows that you are confirming that what I'm reading out 6 is the conclusions that you've all come to. All right? 7 Do you have a copy of it in front of you. 8 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: I do indeed. 9 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. 10 So on the first page of the questionnaire, so 11 short-form conclusion. The question was: 12 "Are you satisfied that, on the balance of 13 probabilities, Sudesh Amman was lawfully killed?" 14 You've answered "yes" to that, and that's the 15 conclusion of you all; correct? 16 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Agreed, my Lord, yes. 17 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you very much. 18 Because this will take a while, you can stand if you 19 like but you can sit because it's going to take a while 20 to go to through it. 21 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: I'm happy to stand. 22 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Then you were asked: 23 "Do you agree with the following statement which is 24 intended to summarise the basic facts of the death of 25 Sudesh Amman?"</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 2</p>	<p>1 shots at him." 2 And you have amended that to read that: 3 "In response, the officers fired a further five 4 shots at him." 5 Then it continues: 6 "And Sudesh Amman was struck three or four times. 7 This was 62 seconds from the time he had run out of the 8 shop. He suffered two significant gunshot injuries, and 9 these were not survivable because he was wearing what 10 appeared to be an explosive vest." 11 And it reads, the earlier version reads: 12 "He was not treated for his injuries for some time." 13 And you've amended that to read: 14 "He was not treated for his injuries until such time 15 that it could be established that the device posed no 16 danger." 17 Then it continues: 18 "Once the apparent explosive vest had been examined 19 and found to be fake, Sudesh Amman was approached by 20 paramedics. He was assessed as dead at the scene." 21 And with the amendments that I have explained, is 22 that the statement of the basic facts of the death of 23 Sudesh Amman to which you have all agreed? 24 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: That's correct, my Lord. 25 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you very much.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 4</p>

<p>1 Then question 1 was in these terms: 2 "Did HM Prison and Probation Service miss 3 an opportunity which may have prevented the attack and 4 the consequent death of Sudesh Amman in not deciding to 5 recall him to prison after being notified on 6 31 January 2020 of the purchases he had made on that 7 date?" 8 You've answered "yes" to that question, and is that 9 the conclusion of you all? 10 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: That is the conclusion of all of 11 us, yes. 12 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: And then in the "reasons" box you've 13 said this: 14 "Whilst the jury does acknowledge that several other 15 avenues were explored in order to recall, there was 16 a missed opportunity as per point 4." 17 That is a reference to point 4 in the list of 18 considerations below the question, and point 4 reads as 19 follows: 20 "The fact that, based on its policy framework, HM 21 Prison and Probation Service could have recalled 22 Mr Amman to prison if satisfied that his behaviour 23 indicated an increased or unmanageable risk of serious 24 harm to the public, or that there was an imminent risk 25 of further offences being committed."</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 "(9) Any risk of compromising the surveillance 2 operation or disclosing intelligence which you consider 3 a search would have created." 4 And do those two points represent your reasoning for 5 the conclusion? And that's the reasoning of you all? 6 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes, we agree to that, my Lord. 7 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. 8 Then finally question 3 was in these terms: 9 "Did the Metropolitan Police Service miss 10 an opportunity which may have prevented the attack and 11 the consequent death of Sudesh Amman in not taking steps 12 to have Mr Amman stopped and searched on 13 2 February 2020, between him leaving the approved 14 premises at 1.22 pm, and the attack beginning at 15 1.57 pm?" 16 The conclusion to that question, the answer is "no", 17 and does that represent the conclusion of you all? 18 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes, it does my Lord. 19 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. 20 Then, so far as the reasoning for that conclusion is 21 concerned, you've said this, reference points 7(a), 22 7(b), and 9, and I shall read those out in a moment. 23 Then you've added: 24 "No further intelligence or suspicions were raised 25 between Saturday and Sunday."</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 7</p>
<p>1 So does that represent the reasoning of you all so 2 far as that question is concerned? 3 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes, it does, my Lord. 4 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. 5 Question 2, the question was this: 6 "Did the police investigation team miss 7 an opportunity which may have prevented the attack and 8 the consequent death of Sudesh Amman in not asking the 9 National Probation Service to organise a search of 10 Mr Amman's room by staff at the approved premises 11 between (a) the time of his purchases on 12 31 January 2020, and (b) the time he left the approved 13 premises at 1.22 pm on 2 February 2020?" 14 You've answered that question "no", and is that the 15 conclusion of you all to that question? 16 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes. 17 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. 18 Then, so far as your reasoning is concerned, you've 19 said this, reference points 8 and 9, and those points 20 are in these terms: 21 "(8) The consideration that asking approved premises 22 staff who had no special search training to carry out 23 a search for the purpose of assisting a police operation 24 would have been a novel step and one over which the 25 police would have had limited control;</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 6</p>	<p>1 Those points are as follows: 2 "7(a) none of the experienced surveillance officers 3 considered or suggested the possibility that the bag was 4 being used to conceal a possible fake or actual suicide 5 belt." 6 7(b) is: 7 "Any decisions of senior officers would be based on 8 observations at the scene." 9 And point 9 is: 10 "Any risk of compromising the surveillance operation 11 or disclosing intelligence which you consider 12 a stop-and-search would have created." 13 And do those factors represent the reasoning of you 14 all? 15 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes, they do, my Lord. 16 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you very much. 17 So that's the questionnaire. 18 Then I've a record of inquest which has been signed 19 by you all, and is that indeed agreed to by all of the 20 jury? 21 THE FOREMAN OF THE JURY: Yes, all the jurors. 22 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Thank you. Then I will in a moment 23 sign that myself. 24 So. Thank you very much. Do take a seat, thank 25 you.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 8</p>

<p>1 So just one or two things I want to say.</p> <p>2 Members of the jury, first of all to you, thank you</p> <p>3 all very much indeed for the evident care and attention</p> <p>4 as well as the time that you've given to this inquest in</p> <p>5 circumstances which haven't always been easy because</p> <p>6 we're operating in the pandemic. But I'm very grateful</p> <p>7 to each one of you, so thank you very much.</p> <p>8 Then Mr Sheldon, please, as I've said before,</p> <p>9 Mr Amman was prepared to risk his life in order to try</p> <p>10 to murder other people. In stark contrast, throughout</p> <p>11 this operation, the Metropolitan Police surveillance</p> <p>12 teams were prepared to put themselves in harm's way in</p> <p>13 order to keep all of us safe, especially the team on</p> <p>14 2 February 2020. That they are all to be commended for</p> <p>15 their bravery and they are owed a considerable debt of</p> <p>16 gratitude for what they did which I gladly acknowledge.</p> <p>17 MR SHELDON: Thank you very much, sir.</p> <p>18 MR JUSTICE HILLIARD: Mr Hough, I also want to thank</p> <p>19 Detective Chief Inspector Luke Williams and the</p> <p>20 Metropolitan Police Stylospore team for the subsequent</p> <p>21 investigation which they carried out into Mr Amman's</p> <p>22 attack.
